Net interest margin (NIM): Most banks earn the majority of their profits by simply loaning money and charging interest to customers. The difference between the average interest rate a bank receives and the average rate it pays is known as its net interest margin. Efficiency ratio: A bank's efficiency ratio measures how much the bank spends to generate every \$100 in revenue. Lower efficiency ratios are better. Net charge-off (NCO) ratio: Calculating this ratio can be useful for comparing asset quality among different institutions since the NCO ratio indicates the annualized percentage of a bank's loans that it ends up writing off as bad debt. Price-to-book. (P/B) ratio: When valuing bank stocks, the price-to-book (P/B) ratio is a company's stock price divided by its net asset value. Two important metrics for analyzing insurance stocks: Combined ratio: To compute this ratio, first add (combine) the amount of money an insurance company pays out in claims to the amount of money the company spends on other business expenses. Divide that amount by the amount the insurance company collects as premium income and verify that the result is less than 100%. A lower combined ratio indicates the insurer is generating greater profit. Investment margin: Insurers profit from underwriting policies and also make money by investing the premiums they collect instead of just holding that money to pay any insurance claims.
