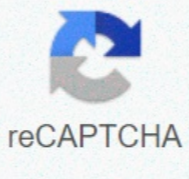




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# Blend words for class 1

What is word for class 1. What are the blend words. Blends for class 1. What is beginning blend words.

There seems to have been a lot of questions about mixtures and digraphs this week. The teachers asked and wanted to know what is the difference between a blend and a digraphist, which to teach first and the best way to teach these skills. Well, with all these questions, that was enough motivation to finish this post that I started literally a year ago. I hope this post can answer some of these burning questions about teaching mixtures and digraphs. Question 1: What is the difference between a blend and a digraph? Consonant Mixtures A consonant mix is when two or more consonants are fused together, but any sound can be heard in the mix. The most common initial consonant mixtures include: bl, br, cl, cr, dr, fr, tr, fl, gl, gr, pl, pr, sl, sm, sp and st. There are also mixtures that contain three consonants. Common mixtures of three consonants include: str, spl, and spr. When teaching mixtures, most teachers introduce them into groups. For example, a teacher may choose to introduce mixtures l (bl, cl, fl, gl, pl and sl) first, followed by r-blends. When introducing the concept of mixes and digraphs, the cue cards often help. Click HERE to download this freebie from my shop TpT Consonant Digraphs In a consonant digraph, two consonants are together to represent a single sound. The most common consonant digraphs are: sh, ch, th, and wh. There are other consonant digraphs (ph); however, most teachers usually introduce these 4 digraphs first as they are often referred to as the "brothers of H." Teaching digraphs can be a lot of fun. However you decide to introduce this concept, make sure to add pictures as they are so useful especially for our readers in difficulty. Here is the specific data sheet for digraphs that I made to introduce the concept. Here are specific instructions for digraphs. Click HERE to download this free cue card from my TpT store Question 2: Which one should be taught first? That's a bit difficult. Some reading programs don't even teach mixes as they are actually two separate sounds. Personally, I think teaching mixes is a good idea as they are letters that occur frequently together so students are learning to recognize patterns in words. Many reading programs introduce mixes before digraphs. I would suggest the following sequence presented in your series Question 3: How do we teach mixes and digraphs? For all learners, but especially for readers in difficulty, the sound instruction and explicit A1 fundamental. A systematic phonic statement refers to the sequence of phonic skills introduced. "Explicit sound instruction" refers to the way skills are taught. Students need instruction where the teacher provides precise directions for teaching skills. Difficult readers require additional guided practice in small groups and the instruction needs to be differentiated to meet individual needs. My girlfriend, Jen, shot this video during the summer using the activity pack's fact sheets for me. Jen is now the headmaster of a middle school (see figure), but before accepting the headmaster, she was a reading specialist at one of our local schools. There are many ways to learn how to learn more about her. This is just one way and I hope it helps my teacher friends who need ideas to introduce this skill.
