Approximately \$11 billion was appropriated over 5 years for operation, expansion, and construction of health centers throughout the nation. About \$9.5 billion was provided to (1) Support ongoing health center operations; (2) Create new health center sites in medically underserved areas; and (3) Expand preventive/ primary health care services. By the end of this fiscal year, approximately \$5 billion in Affordable Care Act resources will have been invested in health centers. Information on locations of health centers is available at: . Because of the Affordable Care Act, more Americans will have access to affordable health insurance coverage. For adolescents, the Affordable Care Act expands health insurance coverage, increases access to comprehensive benefits, and places greater emphasis on prevention and wellness.
